SUPPLIES:

(Gather before starting the video)

EASTER EGG WAR

- 1 (or 2) hard boiled eggs for each participant
- A dining room table (or the like)
- Small pieces of paper with the numbers on them (# of participants)
- Marker or Sharpie (optional)
- Small prize for the winner

EASTER EGG THROW-DOWN

- At least 10-20 pairs of socks
- Laundry basket

EASTER JAM

Below is an overview of two activities in the Easter Jam video.

It's a good idea to read over the directions prior to starting.

You may also want to print out a copy of this and have it on-hand for reference.

ACTIVITY 1: EASTER EGG WAR

WHAT YOU NEED:

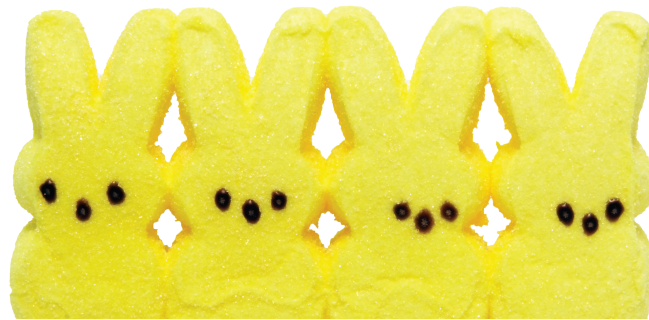
1 (or 2) hard boiled eggs for each participant
A dining room table (or the like)
Small pieces of paper with the numbers on them (# of participants)
Small prize for the winner

WHAT YOU DO:

Each person can decorate their egg/eggs or use already colored eggs.

DIRECTIONS:

Draw numbers and then pair contestants randomly. When we were a family of 6 we paired 1/6, 2/5, 3/4.
First two contestants sit either across a small table or on the corner of a dining table.
Eggs in hand, line up elbow to elbow using books to get eggs to roughly same height.
If possible have a third person "referee".
When referee says go, the two participants say "One, two, three, four I declare an egg war".
When the two eggs "strike" usually one breaks and one does not.
The person whose egg does not break "wins".
The next two participants paired "war".
Eventually the winners of each dual face off against each other until there is a winner.
Winner gets a small prize.



ACTIVITY 2: EASTER EGG THROW-DOWN

WHAT YOU NEED:

10-20 pairs of socks (socks that have matches)
Laundry basket

WHAT YOU DO:

Have two family members battle it out to see who can find the most sock matches, roll them into a ball, or an Easter Egg and toss them into a laundry basket in one minute.

DIRECTIONS:

For this one, you need a laundry basket and socks. LOTS of socks. Clean or dirty, doesn't matter, as long as they have a match.

Next, choose two people to play. You'll also need two people to be scorekeepers.

To get started, dump all the socks on one side of the room. And don't worry, those socks will make their way back to the basket real soon. Then, place the basket on the other side. When the host says "Go," players will grab a sock, go through the pile to find the matching one, roll the socks together in the shape of a ball, or an Easter Egg and then toss them across the room into the laundry/Easter basket.

The player with the most sock-eggs in the basket at the end of the timer wins. If you don't have scorekeepers to help you count, you'll have to keep up with that number on your own! That means everybody's on the honor system, alright?
